# BACKGROUND & INTRODUCTION TO THE LMI

The Legislative Mentorship Initiative (LMI) is a youth leadership development programme founded by the Speaker of the 9th House of Representatives, Rt. Hon. Femi Gbajabiamila, CFR. This programme aims to train the next generation of public sector leaders, especially legislators, to embody the values of good character, commitment and competence and to build their capacity for excellence in public service.



**OUR VISION** is to attract and train dedicated young professionals to serve and excel in the public service, particularly the legislature. Our goal is to develop the next generation of legislators and ethical public sector leaders that are well equipped with responsive leadership skills, knowledge and expertise to enhance public service delivery and foster national cohesion.



#### **OUR STRATEGIC GOALS ARE TO:**

- a) Provide a unique opportunity for legislative leadership talent to be discovered, nurtured and enhanced
- b) Provide rigorous hands-on learning opportunities in the broad areas of public sector leadership
- c) Identify, train, and equip a new generation of public sector leaders, particularly parliamentarians

At the end of the training, our Fellows are expected to demonstrate the following:



- a) The value of selfless and responsive service and understanding of public service as a duty and responsibility to be fulfilled with utmost honesty, diligence and patriotism.
- b) An understanding of Nigerian history in the context of our national vision, the trajectory of Nigeria's constitution, Nigeria's rich parliamentary history and apply lessons learned towards strengthening the legislative process and the emergence of a New Nigeria.
- c) An understanding of the role of parliament in nation building and the legislature as the anchor of democracy.



- d) An understanding of the culture of service, impact and sustained engagement for national development, empowered by hands-on understanding of the rudiments of legislative processes for greater and sustainable impact.
- e) An understanding of the importance of value-based, no-excuse leadership mentality with the competence for disciplined execution of programmes and projects.
- f) Social skills such as emotional intelligence needed to assist the multi-religious, multi-cultural, and muti-ethnic population of Nigeria to live together in justice, peace and prosperity.
- g) The importance of passing the baton by helping our youths "the truth to know" through mentorship, team building and networking

# 2. THE FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME

The Legislative Mentorship Initiative (LMI) Fellowship Programme was a 5-week residential training programme that took place at Abuja from Saturday, 1st October to Sunday, 5th November 2022.

The Fellowship Programme is a first-of-its-kind initiative designed to help young people who are interested in serving in the public sector to gain an in-depth understanding of practical leadership models and navigate the public sector for impact.

The LMI Fellowship Programme was specifically designed and targeted at equipping and empowering dynamic young leaders interested in public sector leadership, especially in the legislature by providing them with necessary hands-on training and engagement in all aspects of governance and public service through collaborative and inclusive leadership.

It is an inclusive programme that consisted of community interactions for 73 participants from all 36 states of Nigeria, plus the FCT between ages 21 and 35, with people with disabilities also represented.

#### THE SELECTION CRITERIA FOR THIS FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME ARE:

- Minimum educational qualification of Degree/HND
- Citizen of the Federal Republic of Nigeria
- Strong and demonstrable leadership skills with credible track record of service to community and society
- English fluency (oral and written) & development of creativity and innovation for practical, inclusive and sustainable solutions
- Patriotic, visionary and passionate about Nigeria's stability, growth and development with Interest and vision for participating in the Nigerian legislature
- Willingness to commit to the values and full programme of the LMI
- Between Ages 21 35

# 3. THE SELECTION PROCESS

On the 26th of June, the LMI was officially launched and applications were opened to the public. Applicants were expected to apply to be a part of the Fellowship Programme via the online portal (www.lmi.ng/apply). They were expected to fill a personal information form, submit 2 essays, a statement of purpose, a curriculum vitae and a one-minute video explaining reasons for applying. The purpose of this was to ensure that all selected participants were patriotic Nigerians, committed to public sector leadership and governance.



Within 24 hours of its launch, the Programme received over 1,000 applications and as at the time applications closed on the 18th of July, over 4,000 applications were received. A Selection Committee was thus created to undertake an impartial, rigorous, merit- and inclusion-based process. The Selection Committee was made up of the following persons:

A dedicated professional working in the Office of the Speaker with a focus on research, policy, international and interparliamentary affairs. She coordinates a range on various high-level national & international projects

### 'Dapo Oyewole

A public policy, international affairs and strategic planning expert with over 20 years' experience in civil society, public and private sectors. A Senior Fellow at Yale University and the Aspen Institute

#### Falila Hamu

The Founder and Managing Partner of a renowned law firm who has also participated & led numerous youth leadership programmes worldwide. She is also a member of the World Economic Forum Global Shapers Community.

After a few weeks of sifting through all submitted applications, 73 fellows were selected, representing all 36 states in Nigeria, including the FCT with a gender balance, as well as inclusion of people living with disabilities. The geographical spread of the selected Fellows is as follows:

The Training Programme ran for five weeks and the Fellows had over 70 engaging sessions including lectures by local and international experts in the public sector, excursions to various MDAs, mock Parliamentary Sittings, group discussions,

### 4.1 TRAINING SESSIONS



### I. HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT OF NIGERIA:

The Journey from Country to Nationhood Facilitator - Prof. Yakubu Ochefu (Secretary, Committee of Vice Chancellors of Nigerian Universities)

This session discussed Nigeria's history and journey of national development. The Fellows were exposed to individuals that led to the creation of the modern Nigerian nation, the reality of Nigeria in the pre-colonial era and colonial era, the struggle for independence, as well as Nigeria's journey to nationhood post-independence.



II. IDEOLOGY OF NATION BUILDING

# Facilitator - Prof. Vincent Anigbogu (Director General, Institute of National Transformation)

This training session examined the concept of nation building and the ideologies that drive it. It explored the commonality of identity, shared values and world view that is required for nation-building. The Fellows learnt about the ideas and process through which a society with diverse people of diverse origins, histories, languages, cultures, and religions can come together within the boundaries of a sovereign state and chart a unified future.



# III. DEVELOPMENT IDEOLOGIES: A Case Study of Development Models Facilitator - Prof. Vincent Anigbogu (Director General, Institute of National Transformation)

This module provided the Fellows perspectives for understanding how the process of change in societies take place. Depending on which development idealogy is adopted, there are different explanations of how nations grow. It explored various existing ideologies of development and examined case studies of development models from across the world, as a context for finding applicable development ideologies for Nigeria.



# IV. BEHAVIORAL ENGINEERING FOR PUBLIC SECTOR LEADERSHIP Facilitator - Dr. James Komolafe (CEO, Saba Resources)

This session exposed the fellows to the behavioural skills and requirements for excellent public sector leadership. It provided insight into how leaders can conduct themselves and engage society with their behavior in a manner that breeds trust, respect and moral authority.



# V. POLICY MAKING AND STRATEGIC PLANNING IN THE PUBLIC SECTOR Facilitator - Patrick Okigbo (Founding Partner, Nextier Advisory)

This topic provided the Fellows-in-Training with the tools and techniques needed for effective evidence-based policy making in the public sector. There was a significant and growing emphasis in the public sector on policy outcomes, value for money and operational efficiency. This topic was particularly important because today, public sector organisations are increasingly required to plan strategically for their future by using strategic planning tools.

Therefore, this topic addressed issues of setting strategic objectives, planning government programmes, and preparing public sector organizations for the future.



# VI. PROTECTING THE FUTURE: Enhancing Policies and Legislation for Climate Change. Facilitator - Prof. Okereke Chukwumerije (Professor in Environment and Development, AEFUNAI, Nigeria)

Climate change is the world's single most important challenge, yet most countries are still quite poorly equipped to deal with its undeniable and increasingly profound impacts. Protecting the planet from the impact of climate change requires strategic long-term planning and collaboration between all sectors of society. Leaders in government, especially parliament have a key role to play in driving policies and legislation to tackle climate change. This training session exposed the Fellows to the need for sound climate legislation and policies in the bid to combat climate change.



### VII. INCLUSIVE GOVERNANCE FOR NATION BUILDING

# Facilitator - Dr. Otive Igbuzor (Chief of Staff to the Senate President/Director, African Centre for Leadership, Strategy and Development)

This topic discussed basic concepts, strategies, and approaches to promote citizen participation and inclusion in governance and nation-building. It examined the various communication tools needed to drive and manage inclusion in governance. Inclusive governance is crucial to nation building and long-term sustainable development. Governance is inclusive when it effectively serves and engages all citizens; considers gender and other facets of personal identity; and when institutions, policies, and public services are accessible, accountable, and responsive to all members of society.



# VIII. INCLUDING PEOPLE LIVING WITH DISABILITIES Facilitator - Amb. Jake Ekpelle (Founder & CEO, Albino Foundation)

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), approximately 1 billion people, or 15%, of the global population are people with disabilities; 80% of whom live in less resourced nations. It is essential that people living with disabilities are included in governance. This topic aimed to introduce the conceptual models and processes in including persons living with disabilities in governance and development programmes. The course introduced these concepts to increase participants' understanding of disability and the needs of persons with disabilities in society.



### IX. GENDER INCLUSION AND NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

### Facilitator - Ms. Lilian Ngusuur Unaegbu (Programme Manager, UN Women)

Gender inclusion and women empowerment are key to achieving inclusive and sustainable development. Although there have been significant achievements over the years, women's socioeconomic disadvantage is still reflected in pervasive gender inequalities in earned income, access to productive resources such as credit and assets, educational attainment, and liberty to pursue a profession. This is a significant missed opportunity that impacts national development. This topic exposed the Fellows on the reality of how to analyze and measure the link between gender inclusion and national development They also gained understanding on how to design policies and programmes to promote women's economic empowerment based on best practices and practical examples.



# X. YOUTH INCLUSION AND NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT Facilitator - Mr. Samson Itodo (Executive Director, YIAGA)

National development cannot be achieved without the meaningful participation of young people. The development of any country depends on the productivity and creativity of its youthful population. The youth in any society are the engines of growth and development because they provide the labour force for production of goods and service. Their actions and inactions can also develop or destroy the fabrics of their society. Hence, including youths in governance and nation-building is critical to sustaining development efforts. This topic was designed to empower and equip the Fellows to address the barriers that inhibit youth participation and inclusion in governance



### XI. THE TRAJECTORY OF NIGERIA'S CONSTITUTION

### Facilitator - Dr. Sam Amadi (Director, Abuja School of Social and Political Thought)

Nigeria's constitutional development history can be divided into two epochal moments and generations; the colonial or pre-independence epoch which covers 6 constitutional instruments. (1914, 1922, 1946, 1951, 1954, and 1960) and the post-independence epoch which covers three constitutional instruments (1963, 1979, and 1999). This topic took the Fellows on a journey through Nigeria's constitutional development across these two epochal moments and highlighted the issues that necessitated constitutional amendments.



# XII. STRATEGIC ADVOCACY: METHODS, TOOLS & TECHNIQUES Facilitator - Abubakar Jimoh (Head of Communications at Civil Society Legislative Advocacy Centre (CISLAC)

Advocacy is the active support of an idea or cause expressed through strategies and methods that influence the opinions and decisions of people and organisations. In the political and development context, the aims of advocacy are to create or change policies, laws, regulations, distribution of resources or other decisions that affect people's lives and to ensure that such decisions lead to implementation. This topic examined some commonly used advocacy tools and techniques such as policy monitoring, policy dialogue, campaigns, etc. The Fellows participated in live scenarios using the techniques and strategies learnt.



# XIII. POLITICAL COMMUNICATION: METHODS, TOOLS & TECHNIQUES Facilitator - Ajuri Ngelale (Senior Special Assistant to the President on Public Affairs)

Political communication refers to all communication and interaction that occurs in a political context. This topic introduced participants to the tools typically engaged in political communication including agenda-setting, political marketing techniques, and crafting of communication strategies. Participants also developed skills in the analysis of the process and outcomes of political communication. This course helped the Fellows communicate better, understand political communication and the role that facts and evidence-based communication will play in good governance.



### XIV. LEGISLATIVE SYMBOLS, SITTINGS AND PROCEEDINGS

Facilitator - Barr. Oscar Okoro (Clerk, House Committee on Finance/House of Representatives Chamber Staff)

In parliamentary proceedings symbols often signify the responsibilities of people in elected offices. This topic examined the various legislative symbols such as the mace and gavel and enlightened the Fellows on what these symbols represent. This course also explored the various processes and procedures of the legislative arm of government. The Fellows were also exposed to how legislative sittings and proceedings are conducted.



### XV. PARLIAMENTARY DEMOCRACY AND NATION BUILDING

Facilitator - John Mutu (Deputy Team Leader, UK Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) Partnership to Engage, Reform and Learn (PERL))

Parliamentary democracy is a system of government in which citizens elect representatives to a legislative parliament to make the necessary laws and decisions for the country. This parliament directly represents the people and plays a central role in nation-building because it serves as a melting pot for the interests of all members of the society. This topic examined the concept of nation-building and the role of parliamentary democracy in driving nation-building efforts.

## XVI. PARLIAMENT AND CIVIL SOCIETY ENGAGEMENT FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Facilitator - Afolabi Adekiayaoja (Research Analyst, Centre for Democracy and Development)

Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) play a major role in driving sustainable development in order to improve economic, social and political conditions in developing countries. This topic examined how the parliament could engage and partner with CSOs to further improve the effectiveness of development co-operation in delivering the sustainable development goals.



### XVII. THE LEGISLATURE AS THE ANCHOR OF DEMOCRACY

# Facilitator - Amb. Jerry Ugokwe (Two-Term Member of House of Representatives & Former Ambassador to Austria, Slovakia and UN Offices in Vienna)

The role of the legislative arm of government in a modern democracy cannot be over emphasised. A virile legislature will promote political stability and economic development, while a weak legislature will lead to political instability, underdevelopment, and will enthrone an autocratic and oppressive government. The legislature serves as an anchor of democracy through law-making, oversight functions and representation. This topic examined the theories and concepts of the democracy and the legislature's role in its sustenance.

## XVIII. DEVELOPING THE CULTURE OF SERVICE: SKILLS, VALUES AND ETHICS FOR EFFECTIVE PUBLIC SERVICE

## Facilitator - Ms. Enene Ejembi (Head of Strategic Communications and Knowledge Management, DAI)

The quality of a country's public service delivery is key to its economic performance and the well-being of its citizens. An effective and efficient public administration serves the needs of its citizens and advances public good and social development. Hence, there is a need for public servants to develop a culture of service and abide by certain values and ethics that are consistent with the principles of democracy. In this training session, the Fellows were equipped with the knowledge, skills and values for effective public service delivery.



# XIX. CAMPAIGNS, ELECTIONEERING & CONSTITUENCY ENGAGEMENT: SIMULATIONS AND CASE STUDIES. Facilitator - Hon. Akin Alabi (Member of the 9th House of Representative and Chair, Committee on Inter-governmental Affairs)

Campaigns, electioneering, and constituency engagement are key areas of the political process. This topic adopted a hands-on, innovative, and dynamic approach to exploring the strategic elements of political campaign management and constituency engagement in Nigeria. The Fellows were exposed to real strategies and case studies in constituency engagement and the overall reality of campaigning, electioneering and constituency engagement.



## XX. NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF LEGISLATIVE AND DEMOCRATIC STUDIES (NILDS) NIGERIA'S RICH PARLIAMENTARY HISTORY

Facilitator - Prof. Abubakar Suleiman, (Director-General, National Institute for Legislative and Democratic Studies (NILDS))

At the Fellows learning visit to NILDS, they learnt that Parliament in Nigeria has evolved and developed in phases from the colonial era to post-independence era. They explored and traced the development trajectory of the Nigerian legislature from the Legislative Council of 1862 to the present-day Bi-cameral legislature made up of two Independent Chambers: the senate and the House of Representatives.

The DG, who hosted the Fellows imparted exceptional words of wisdom and shared inspirational insight with the Fellows at this event

## RUDIMENTS OF LEGISLATIVE DRAFTING: WRITING EXCELLENT AND IMPACTFUL MOTIONS, BILLS AND REPORTS

Facilitator - Dr. S. A. Dawanka (Head, Legal Services, NILDS)

Also at NILDS, the Fellows learnt that Legislators are tasked with transforming government policy into written law, but also tasked with ensuring that legislation are concise and clearly understandable giving minimal room for ambiguity and misinterpretation. Achieving both can be challenging as government policy often involves complex issues that are difficult to convey in everyday language. This topic helped the Fellows adopt a practical and hands-on approach to being equipped with the tools and skills for creating excellent legislation, emphasizing vocabulary, structure, language, style.





# XXI. PARLIAMENTARY DIPLOMACY: LEGISLATIVE INTERVENTIONS IN POLICY MAKING, DEMOCRACY AND DEVELOPMENT

Facilitator - Prof. Femi Otubanjo (Research Professor on International Politics and Strategic Studies, Nigerian Institute of International Affairs)

There has been an increase in the role parliaments play in foreign affairs and international relations. Parliamentary Diplomacy is an important alternative form of diplomacy, which concerns the full range of international activities undertaken by parliamentarians to increase mutual understanding and cooperation between countries. Traditionally, diplomacy has been viewed as an exclusive purview of the executive arm of government, however, the relevance of parliaments in driving dialogue on key international issues and achieving resolution through parliamentary routes has become evident in recent times. In this training session, we examined parliamentary diplomacy, providing examples of how parliaments can and indeed do exercise their powers to legislate and hold government to account at the global and regional levels.



# XXII. INTERACTIVE WORKSHOP ON EFFECTIVE PUBLIC SPEAKING FOR LEADERS Facilitator - Prof. Okey Ikechukwu (Executive Director, Development Specs Academy)

Parliamentary debates are a key instrument through which parliaments propose and discuss policies, laws, and national issues. Becoming skilled at parliamentary debating takes an enormous amount of time, practice, and concerted effort. This session adopted a practical and hands-on approach to help the Fellows improve their debating and public speaking skills.



XXIII. LEGISLATIVE PROTOCOL & ETIQUETTE

Facilitator - Mr. Godwin Okon Ekpeyong, (Director, Protocol, NASS)

This session exposed the Fellows to the procedures, protocols and system of rules governing behaviour within the Nigerian legislature. They learnt about the various roles within the legislature and the rules of conduct parliamentarians adhere to during plenary sessions. Participants also learnt various tips for composition and interaction with members of the legislature in official capacity.



XXIV. NATIONAL ASSEMBLY PROTOCOLS & CHAMBER ETIQUETTE Facilitator - Major R. K. Adebayo (rtd.) (Sergeant at Arms, NASS)

This training session focused on the the rules, ethics, and customs governing proceedings of the National Assembly. The Fellows learnt the various rules of behaviour and courtesies to be followed when in chambers. It also highlighted the rules and principles of parliamentary procedure and practice, the Standing Orders and Rules of Order for Plenary and Committee meetings, voting methods and so on.



XXV. UNDERSTANDING GOVERNMENT PROTOCOL AND ETIQUETTE Facilitator - Mrs. Sonye Allanah (CEO, Consima Protocol & Finishing School)

This training session examined the ceremonial aspects of protocol procedures, rules of diplomatic interactions, etiquette, and rules of courteousness within government ranks. The Fellows were equipped with tools required to understand expected conduct or behaviour when dealing with high-ranking government officials and the critical skills needed to succeed in a multicultural and demanding workplace that involves interaction with government and diplomatic officials. The session adopted practical and interactive approaches to etiquette and protocol issues, emphasising real-life case studies, scenarios and situations that could be encountered. The Fellows also presented their Group Case Study Presentation on the topic.



# XXVI. LEGISLATIVE ETHICS, PRIVILEGE AND VALUES Facilitator - Hon. Abubakar Yunusa (Chairman, House Committee on Federal Road Safety Commission)

Public sector leaders are expected to exercise ethical leadership and abide by certain standards, value, and principles. This topic provided the Fellows with an overview of legislative ethics and values, focusing on the roles and responsibilities of legislators and their conduct in carrying out their official responsibility. They examined core theories of ethics with the aim of relating these to the legislature. They also examined various approaches to codifying and enforcing legislative ethics and values"



XXVII. CULTIVATING RELATIONSHIPS, MANAGING STAKEHOLDERS AND LOBBYING

### Facilitator - Hon Henry Nwawuba (Committee Chair on the Legislative Agenda)

Success as a legislator will require skill and expertise in building relationships and forging mutually beneficial connections, managing diverse stakeholder expectations and lobbying. The session trained the Fellows on how to build sustainable relationships, as legislators and how to manage stakeholder needs and interests to ensure optimum results as public sector leaders.



## XXVIII. BECOMING A PARLIAMENTARIAN: STEPS, PROCESSES, FINANCING AND OUTCOMES

## Facilitator - Hon. Adewunmi Onanuga (Committee Chair on Women Affairs and Social Development)

This session examined the steps and processes of becoming a parliamentarian in Nigeria. The Fellows were guided through the requirements for attaining parliamentary office. They also learnt from the practical experiences of the Facilitator.



XXIX. EFFECTIVE PUBLIC SECTOR LEADERSHIP: TOOLS, STYLES AND TECHNIQUES

Facilitator - Dr. Ike Neliaku, FNIPR (Executive Secretary, Nigerian Prize for Leadership)

The political and economic landscape is constantly changing and new challenges are evolving that require effective and responsive public sector Leadership. Leadership is critical to good governance and public sector leaders need to be equipped with the right tools to navigate current global challenges. This session explored various tools and styles for effective leadership in the public sector. The Fellows were equipped to employ these tools to lead in today's public sector.



XXX. BUILDING A PERSONAL BRAND AND REPUTATION AS A CORE ASSET Facilitator - Mal. Mukhtar Z. Sirajo, FNIPR (President, Nigerian Institute of Public Relations)

Every individual should have a personal brand. Personal branding is what shapes the perception of an individual in the eyes of the public. It entails building a reputation, creating a public image, and marketing oneself as an individual. This session took the Fellows through the importance of building and maintaining a strong personal brand and the steps involved in successfully doing so.



XXXI. CRITICAL THINKING AND PROBLEM SOLVING

Facilitator - Prof. Okey Ikechukwu (Executive Director, Development Specs

Academy)

Critical thinking and problem solving have been identified as skills that are critical to the success of individuals and organisations. The ability to think effectively, assess problems and design a solution is necessary in both public and private sector workplaces. This session helped the Fellows improve their thought processes, ask the right questions, challenge assumptions, and consider varying viewpoints in assessing a problem. They have been equipped to properly identify and systematically work through a problem in a comprehensive manner, ensuring clarity in making decisions or recommendations.



## XXXII. ENGAGING INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT PARTNERS FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Facilitator - Dr. Chris Pycroft (Development Director, Foreign Commonwealth Development Office (FCDO)

Strong global partnerships and international cooperation are crucial to the achievement of sustainable development. This session examined the role of international development partners in achieving sustainable development. Several programmes and projects driven by the federal and state governments will benefit immensely from technical support and cooperation from international development partners and so, this session helped the Fellows to understand why international development partners are essential to Nigeria's development and how best to engage them.



XXIII. UNDERSTANDING THE SENATE: STRUCTURE, ADMINISTRATION AND INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

Facilitator - Mr. Ibrahim Tafawa Balewa (Special Assistant to the Senate President on International Affairs)

Nigeria runs a bi-cameral legislature with the Upper Chamber as the Senate and the lower chamber as the House of Representatives. This session enlightened the Fellows on the importance of synergy between both chambers. It also focused on the way the Senate operates in the National Assembly as well as in collaboration with the House of Representatives.

Fellows share their LMI Experience in their own words

#### **OLISE ABU, BENUE STATE**

The Legislative Mentorship Initiative (LMI) is a thought-provoking and wholesome experience (mental, physical, emotional, and social) that encapsulates a quality educational experience - in that, the LMI, did not just fill a pail (though it equipped one with nation-building tools), it lit a fire. A fire and force inscribing the DNA of excellent, detribalized, thoroughbred, and erudite public servants and political/social change-makers working assiduously to see Nigeria lead Africa to economic prosperity, socio-political stability, robust foreign



policy, and fertile environment for technological innovation – as we approach the fourth industrial revolution.

Before delving into the renewed spark ignited by this quintessential fellowship, one cannot help but commend its wholesomeness in reiterating the connection between a sound mind and a sound body and the importance of meditation and reflection. Fellows were given a fitness instructor for exercise every morning by 6 am - and 24hrs access to the gym. We were comfortably accommodated and had a lot of quiet places for meditation – and we were encouraged to carry out personal reflection. The aim wasn't merely for comfort but for developing the complete human being - as Socrates puts it, an unexamined life is not worth living. There was also an in-house doctor who was with us everywhere we went. But most importantly, the LMI Staff were all accessible as many fellows could easily share their personal problems or dreams – a lesson on empathetic leadership for us all! All these made LMI go beyond a collegial atmosphere to a familial one. For example, we held keenly contested elections for principal officers akin to the Legislature - but we never lost ourselves and a sense of collective purpose.

Consequently, The LMI has lit a fire with education, networking and experience centred on the Legislature, research, national cohesion, development paradigms and ideologies, and socio-cultural and political-economic history. The LMI also involved soft skills in public speaking, protocol and etiquette in government, emotional intelligence, and diplomacy. Whilst LMI provided several excursions, two places gave an extra dose of belief and dream. The first was the opportunity to receive lectures and simulate parliamentary debates in the National Assembly, which made many believe they could be lawmakers too. Secondly, a visit to the State House was surreal and spoke to the hearts of many that it is possible to occupy it - with hard work and a commitment to serve.

I'm grateful for the incidental learning of cross-cultural friendships and partnerships with brothers/sisters from the 36 states together.

From Abia to Zamfara, fellows are working together to enlighten citizens on engaging the Legislature. We are poised to do more. Hence, I express profound gratitude to the Speaker of the 9th House of Representatives, Rt. Hon. Femi Gbajabiamila for birthing this initiative. I'm deeply grateful to the organisers, led by the fellowship director, Mr. Dapo Oyewole. Special thanks to all facilitators, technical staff, security, and drivers who all made the fellowship a success.

#### **FAREED IBRAHIM, ZAMFARA STATE**

I applied for the Legislative Mentorship Initiative (LMI) when my plans to leave the country were solidified. It was the last straw before I lost all hope in the country. I have rekindled my passion for my initiative and begun training for the next set of volunteers. 

One of the most significant takeaways for me was learning about the role and functions of legislative bodies and how they can play a crucial role in shaping the direction and policies of a country. I also gained a deeper understanding of the importance of effective communication and lobbying skills in the legislative process. I equally contested for the position of Chief Whip, an experience that further exposed me to the realities of elections beyond tabloids and Twitter.

In addition to the theoretical aspects of the program, we also had the opportunity to participate in simulations and group exercises that allowed us to apply the concepts we learned in a more practical setting. This helped me better understand the legislative process's complexities and challenges and how to navigate them effectively. We visited key places such as the EFCC, NILDS, NARC, Shehu Musa YarAdua Centre and a host of others.

Furthermore, the training helped me to identify interesting ways to collaborate with the government to achieve growth for Kwara state and Nigeria. Through the various networking opportunities and guest speakers, I was able to make valuable connections with individuals who are working towards similar goals.

I believe that by working together and leveraging our collective expertise and resources, we can significantly impact our community and drive positive change.

Fellows-in-training, including myself, were comfortably domiciled in Abuja during the fellowship program. We all had standard rooms each with complete access to the outdoor swimming pool, gym facilities, praying area (for Muslims) and regular feeding for over 5 weeks.

For some of our sessions at the National Assembly or anywhere else, the LMI team was very responsive in providing excellent meals and more than enough drinking water for everyone, I miss the Chicken soup, to be honest. The LMI team orchestrated our comfortable movements within and outside the hotel by providing comfortable buses to take us to the National Assembly, Excursions and Picnics.

We had a live-in fitness coach, Pedro and he was very hands-on with our morning fitness routine and aerobics, we sometimes danced on weekends. We frequently organized gender- inclusive football matches, amateur swimming competitions with the LMI team supervision.

During the fellowship period, we had Doctor Uzor on standby for all of our medical needs such as regular vital check-ups, medications, or even Neurogesic if you nearly sprained your ankle while playing football like me. Overall, the welfare was great, the feeding was superb, thanks to the LMI team who were accommodating. Lastly, the media team took mind-blowing pictures of everyone and were very open to sharing them with us. Thank you team LMI.

Overall, I am extremely grateful for the opportunity to participate in the first cohort of LMI. It has not only expanded my knowledge and skills in the realm of leadership and governance, but it has also inspired me to become more actively involved in driving positive change in my community. I highly recommend the LMI program to anyone looking to make a difference and contribute to the development of their country. The LMI team was very helpful, highly accommodating, friendly and committed to fellow's welfare and development. Hopefully, I will be able to impact future cohorts of the LMI Fellows as a trainer or volunteer.





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
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
